
SUMMARY OF OUTCOMES PRODUCED BY GRANT RECIPIENTS


Businesses Served

Jobs Created or Preserved


Businesses served by grant recipients have created or preserved 11,722 jobs since FY13, with an average of \$768 invested per job.

Loans Financed

Technical assistance provided by grant recipients includes advice on submitting successful loan applications. Grantees have leveraged \$165 million in loans for businesses, \$19 for every grant dollar since FY13.


SUPPORTING SMALL BUSINESS GROWTH & EMPLOYMENT

The Small Business Technical Assistance Grant Program funds the delivery of critical services to businesses helping them to grow in Massachusetts. The competitive grants are awarded to nonprofit economic development organizations that provide:

- Customized technical assistance for small businesses.
- · Training to fill gaps in the business skills of owners and managers.
- · Access to capital to start and grow the business.
- · Resources and mini-grants to contract professional services such as accounting and marketing.

Over \$9 million in grants distributed since FY13.
