About the Collaborative Workspace Program

Our fiscal year 2023 report details the seventh round of Collaborative Workspace Program grants. This program provides a vehicle for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to fund innovation centers, incubators, makerspaces, artists' spaces, collaborative kitchens, and traditional coworking spaces. The benefits that these facilities offer include shared equipment and tools, mentoring and educational programming, and peer-to-peer support, creating real economic opportunities for members.

Picture, if you will, a room filled with hard-working individuals, each with creative ideas and plans for their own start-up business. The positive work environment, shared resources, and opportunity to connect with like-minded individuals can turn ideas into action and spur professional relationships with lasting benefits.

This year, 39 grants totaling \$1,197,000 were awarded for funding in 25 communities across the state. The application process was part of the Commonwealth's One Stop for Growth initiative, a new streamlined application portal for the state's economic and community development grant programs – six of which are administered by MassDevelopment.

Coworking spaces continue to revolutionize the way we do business. Our support encourages the growth of sustainable operations that increase creative output and help pursue long-term planning. We're proud to administer this program and look forward to seeing its continued impact in cities and towns across Massachusetts.

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WorcLab, Worcester

MassDevelopment has had a long relationship with WorcLab, a business incubator and coworking space located on Portland Street in the heart of downtown Worcester. The collaborative workspace has been pivotal in fueling economic development in the region, offering coworking, office, and event space and additive manufacturing support in-house to propel its members' ideas into the marketplace.

MassDevelopment has previously supported the organization through the Collaborative Workspace Program with grants for general space improvements and upgrades, new equipment, furnishings, fit-out of a prototyping lab, and more. Today, small businesses are growing and thriving at WorcLab's incubator space. One of those companies, Embue, Inc., is using its innovative smart building platform to help multifamily housing owners and operators embrace clean energy standards. It's a small world: Embue recently received a \$3.8 million loan from MassDevelopment's Emerging Technology Fund to hire 38 new full-time employees.











GrubStreet Center for Creative Writing, Boston

The GrubStreet Center for Creative Writing is a vibrant, welcoming space that offers a racially and economically diverse community of teen and adult writers access to writing classes, literary arts education, and a home for artistic collaboration, creation, and programming.

With the support of MassDevelopment's Collaborative Workspace Program, GrubStreet completed the construction of a new HVAC system, including the installation of additional fan coil units and high-quality air filters throughout its space. Important ADA accessibility upgrades were also made to allow for expanded literary programs for all ages and backgrounds.

Thanks in part to the new HVAC installation and essential improvements, Mass Poetry and Porter Square Books: Boston Edition are now anchor tenants at GrubStreet, enjoying a productive and flourishing partnership with each other and the community.













TLE Center for Urban Entrepreneurship, Lawrence


The TLE Center for Urban Entrepreneurship's primary focus is to provide support to individuals with the greatest barriers to resources needed to develop a business—particularly those who identify as Black and Latinx, LGBTQ+, who have been previously incarcerated, or have historically not had equitable access to the knowledge and means to establish an independent, thriving company. The organization empowers micro-entrepreneurs in the beauty and personal care services industry to grow a bankable business.

With the help of a \$25,000 grant from MassDevelopment's Collaborative Workspace Program, TLE Center for Urban Entrepreneurship's coworking space launched in April 2023 with 16 aspiring business owners who were able to access training and develop growth strategies for their own small startup businesses—including many looking to expand within greater Lawrence. The grant has also helped bolster partnerships with organizations like MassHire, UTEC, Volunteers of America, and Lawrence CommunityWorks.











Groundwork, Fall River

Groundwork in Fall River is a new 5,000-square-foot workspace and the second "Groundwork" location on the south coast. After securing Collaborative Workspace Program grant funding from MassDevelopment, the organization was able to add two conference rooms with meeting technology, two soundproof phone booths, and additional seating in open areas. The grant funding also allowed Groundwork to install a 24/7 mobile access system and a WiFi network. In less than a year, membership has grown to 39 members with 80% of private office space currently occupied. Monthly "lunch and learn" programs are popular, and an increase in requests for tours has been an indicator of potential further growth.

A particular highlight of the past year was a visit to Groundwork in April 2023 by Governor Maura Healey and Lt. Governor Kim Driscoll, who attended a roundtable meeting with members of the greater Fall River business community.

Zea Mays Printmaking, Florence

Zea Mays Printmaking (ZMP) is a professional printmaking studio located in western Massachusetts. Since its founding in 2000, ZMP's mission has been to provide a space and community to learn, create, and promote prints made with the safest processes available. Zea Mays Printmaking collaborates with artists, studios, and schools around the world to share innovations in non-toxic and sustainable printmaking. The 6,000-square-foot, state-of-theart printmaking facility provides studio access for over 100 artist members, residencies, exhibitions, and educational programs.

With support from MassDevelopment's Collaborative Workspace Program, the organization was able to upgrade its HVAC system and maintain a stable and comfortable working environment through an exceptionally hot summer. The climate-controlled building is especially important for the preservation of the hundreds of works stored and maintained in the studio. With an increase in membership, Zea Mays has been able to offer financial aid assistance to lower-income artists who wish to become members.
